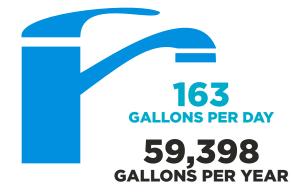

ENVIRONMENT

WHAT WE DID TO PROTECT LAND AND WATER

- for use in current and future restoration projects.
- Planted over 3,000 native plants on the Lester Airstrip restoration site in collaboration with Conservation Northwest and a grant from the Drinking Water Providers Partnership.
- Removed noxious weeds, on a two-acre restoration site, with help from Washington Conservation Corps crews, funded by a Re-Green the Green grant (through King County).
- Salvaged over 4,000 native plants from sites within the watershed
 Mechanically removed 267,000 sq. ft. (0.6 acres) of invasive plant species (primarily blackberry) along a stream supporting spawning salmon
 - Then planted 1,235 native plants to compete with the invasives and provide habitat/water quality improvements over time.

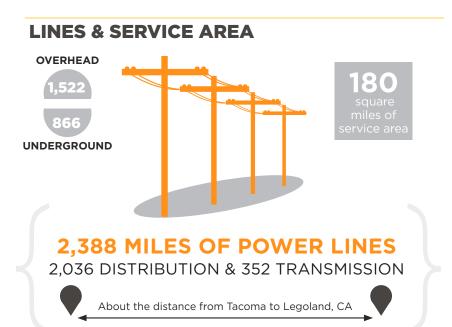
- Upgraded to S&P's bond rating of AA+ from AA.
- Worked with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to complete design and construction of the downstream fish passage facility at Howard Hansen Dam and advocated to receive \$220M from the Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act to help fund the project.
- Created a dashboard to monitor data of the water quality in Eagle Lake Reservoir ahead of the fish passage project.
- Launched a watershed-specific strategic plan to focus efforts for the next five years.
- Released an expanded 16-page children's activity book to tell the story of Tacoma's water coming from the mountains to the city and highlight careers in the water utility.



We continued to help secure the physical and financial safety of customers and employees during the second year of a global pandemic. Large projects (e.g., advanced meters, Energy Imbalance Market) saw great success in the face of multiple challenges.

GENERATION in megawatt-hours produced per year

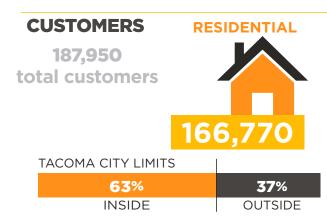

 Reared and released 1,440,058 and 8,653,573 fish at Cushman and Cowlitz hatcheries, respectively. and transported 12.738 and 763.517 at Cowlitz and Cushman fish passage facilities, respectively, in support of salmon recovery efforts.

Conserved over 20,000 acres of land for wildlife habitat and monitored species of concern. such as wood ducks and several bat species.

NOTEWORTHY

- We went live in the Western Energy Imbalance Market (EIM) allowing participants in the West to offer excess generation capacity or buy lower-cost wholesale power when needed.
- Our utility received high marks from Western Electricity Coordinating Council (WECC) following our 2022 audit. Every three years, WECC audits electric utilities to assess compliance with North American Reliability Corporation (NERC) federal Standards and Requirements.
- We completed our biennial budget for 2023/2024 while staying focused on developing a budget that supports our operational needs while maintaining low rates during a time of inflation.

- We received the Tree Line USA Award from the Arbor Day Foundation for the 18th consecutive year in recognition for our commitment to proper tree pruning, planting, and care.
- Our employees improved safety at our hydro projects by creating a Lone Worker Safe Practice Team at Cowlitz, and by introducing a second raft and creating a custom hitching device to safety transport the rafts from the work truck to the shoreline of the Nisqually River.
- The APPA awarded us an honorable mention Safety Award for the advancement of the Safety Culture and Programs.



Since 1914, Tacoma Rail has worked to meet our primary goal of providing efficient, cost-effective rail service. 2022 was no exception; we provided service to areas as diverse as the Port of Tacoma and Tacoma's industrial areas (Tidelands Division), Lakeview (Capital Division), and Frederickson (Mountain Division).

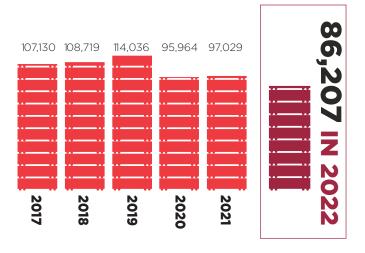


SERVICE AREA
