SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans Now Available in Some Washington Counties

The U.S. Small Business Administration is offering designated states and territories, including Washington, low-interest federal disaster loans for working capital to small businesses suffering substantial economic injury as a result of the Coronavirus (COVID-19).

SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans offer up to \$2 million in assistance and can provide vital economic support to small businesses to help overcome the temporary loss of revenue they are experiencing.

These loans may be used to pay fixed debts, payroll, accounts payable and other bills that can't be paid because of the disaster's impact. The interest rate is 3.75% for small businesses. The interest rate for non-profits is 2.75%.

The Pierce County Health Department has provided instructions on how to prepare for COVID-19 in your business.

- Actively encourage sick employees to stay home.
- Ensure your sick leave policies are up to date.
- Prepare for increased number of absences.
- Notify employees of any confirmed COVID-19 cases.

In addition, as of March 10th, TPCHD is recommending additional precautions for the most vulnerable populations. Those at higher risk include:

- People with weakened immune systems from medical conditions or medical treatment.
- Adults over age 60.
- Pregnant women.

For these groups, TPCHD is recommending they

- Avoid gatherings of 10 or more people including social gatherings
- Minimize errands and when possible getting friends or family to assist or using online services
- Explore flex and tele-work arrangements with their employers
