
Public Utility Board

Earlier this year, the Public Utility Board underwent some membership changes. Woodrow Jones retired as chair after a long career with the City of Tacoma and tenure on the Board. Karen Larkin, a former City of Tacoma and Washington state employee, took over as chair. Bryan Flint, executive director of Sound Outreach, became vice chair, and Mark Patterson, an attorney with Vandeberg, Johnson & Gandara became secretary. New member Carlos M.

Watson, a realtor with Keller Williams, joined Christine Cooley, the Water Resource Program manager for the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, as our newest Board members. The Public Utility Board is a fiveperson governing body for Tacoma Public Utilities. The Tacoma City Council appoints its members, who serve fiveyear terms without pay and weigh in on the high-level direction for how the utility serves our community. The new Board's priorities include implementing a series of strategic directives designed to focus the utility on longterm results. U*

Nation's "coolest" cold storage facility creates jobs and saves energy

Congressman Derek Kilmer, officials from Tacoma Power and the Bonneville Power Administration (BPA), recently joined NewCold executives for a visit to its newest highly automated 135-foot tall, high-bay cold storage warehouse in Tacoma – one of the two most energy-efficient in the country by more than 50%. The energy savings rebate, made possible by a partnership with Tacoma Power and

the BPA's Energy Smart Industrial program, helped make Tacoma an even more compelling place to locate its facility and bring 75 new jobs.

NewCold will save \$6 million over the next 10 years from reducing energy use by eight million kilowatt-hours per year. That is enough clean, renewable energy to power more than 600 average homes in our community. U*

"Chew" to blame for 181 power outages

The numbers are in, and last year's number one cause of unplanned outages in our service area was animal-related. More than wind, ice, tree limbs, and even cars, squirrels, birds, and other rodents accounted for 181 outages in 2018, nearly a third of all unplanned outages.

In 2018, squirrels alone accounted for 244,117 power outages across the nation. Since the American Public Power Association (APPA) started tracking the issue in 2015, research shows squirrels have been more successful at cutting power than any cyberterrorist!

We follow APPA's recommendation, using vegetation control to help curb the problem. Tree trimmers tackle more than 770 miles of power line maintenance each year, removing branches that give wildlife access to our lines. U*

HOW-TO TIPS

Get your yard ready for the winter chill

Fall is a great time to think about preparing your yard for colder weather. If you maintain a healthy landscape now, it may reduce your water bill and save you money later. Follow these tips to help you start:

- Put your garden to bed by cutting back, cleaning, planting, and protecting it.
- Adjust and slow your irrigation system to prevent overwatering during colder months.
- Fertilize lawns to improve root structure to help them withstand next summer's hot weather.
- Plant trees and shrubs so roots can establish over the winter.
- Remove your hose timer from the hose bib, so it does not freeze.

What do to if you lose power

- Report a power outage by calling 253-502-8602.
- Track outages via our outage map at MyTPU.org/OutageMap.
- Do not use a natural gas or propane grill indoors. These fuels give off dangerous fumes.
- Never plug portable or auxiliary generators into a wall outlet.
